## In 2018 we...

- provided **food boxes to 17,769 families**, with a total of 32,905 members served. Thanksgiving baskets: 391, Christmas: 411, Easter: 89
- transitioned multiple families off public assistance
- provided \$77,133 in monetary assistance to help families with water bills, housing, ID cards, and more

# We provided options for individuals who fell victim to predatory lending.

In 2018 \$13,994 was lent out to help community members pay off "Payday" and Title loans. Our micro-loan program assists individuals who have a payday or car title loan and are paying close to 400% interest on their loan. If an applicant's request is accepted, we pay off their loan and they pay us back at no interest.

In February 2019, we graduated eight more families from Northeast Community Fund's Family Investment Program. Since 2014 this program has intensively partnered with families to transition them off public assistance.

From a single mother with three children who was thinking about continuing her education but didn't know how she could afford it to a young couple who wanted a better life for their new baby to a 40 year old grandmother who has lived her entire life on public assistance, our graduates are people who wanted a bigger, better lives for themselves and their children. They just didn't know where to start.

We are so proud of our Family Investment Program graduates, as, this is just



## A final note from former Executive Director, Jerry Pelz

An old rundown house at 1119 E Condit served both as my first home and the first office for NECF. It wasn't much to look at, but as a "poverty worker" fresh out of college, it was just fine. I had a place to live, a \$150 per month salary, and passion to change the world.

I soon learned that I was probably not going to change the world, but I could make a positive difference in the lives of people I came in contact with. So, that's what I did, for 50 years in my work at Northeast. I quickly discovered that to make significant impact on people in need, I needed to meet them where they are at.



In the late 60s and early 70s agencies like DMCOC, NECF, Dove and CHIC were founded with humble beginnings by community partners. Through strong leadership, community support, and a little bit of faith, these agencies have grown to be part of the backbone of our community.

At NECF, faith means more than just a religious affiliation. We operated for 50 years under the premise that, if we remain true to the mission and ministry that we have been called to do, the agency will be blessed. And, we have been.
